Mass Unwrap

On Saturday 29th June Transition Buxton volunteers staged a Mass Unwrap event in Morrisons to visibly demonstrate how much avoidable single use plastic is used by the supermarkets - over 900,000 tonnes per year! In just two hours the team removed a large supermarket trolley full of unnecessary plastic from the 40 shoppers who took part.

We are grateful to Morrisons Buxton for allowing us to do this in their store, and to the shoppers who allowed us to strip the plastic packaging off their shopping. Whilst there is still a long way to go, it was encouraging to realise that it is possible to buy more fruit and veg without plastic than a few years ago - but why not all?

The activity is part of the process to maintain our Plastic Free Community status which is awarded by Surfers Against Sewage. The award also involves supporting local businesses and community groups to reduce their reliance on single-use plastic. See our website here for details. Love BMAG

On 8th June, to mark the anniversary of the 'temporary' closure of Buxton Museum & Art Gallery (BMAG), Transition Buxton members were pleased to join some 200 local people who turned out in support of this valuable but struggling institution. Along with all those who attended and the 5000 who have signed the petition we are keen to see the cultural fabric of our town restored and maybe even enhanced.


Discussions involving some community representatives are now underway with the aim of finding a viable home and future for BMAG, and for the endangered heritage building which has housed it for nearly 100 years. We will do our best to keep you informed, but keep your eye on local press and social media.

Orchard Update

Work has continued at some of the dispersed orchard sites, notably Sherwood Road with its 10 trees and Gadley Lane (15 trees). This has involved filling sacks with donated wood chip and carting them to the orchards, where, after clearing away grass and weeds from around the trees, the wood chip is spread as a weedsuppressant. Similar activities have taken place at other sites. It is important that the wood chip is at least six months old before use. The trees have blossomed and tiny apples are appearing. 
Borrow Don't Buy

Buxton Library of Things, works very much like the book library on Kents Bank Road where it is based - you borrow an item, use it, return it, then someone else can do the same. With nearly 100 different items available to borrow for low fees this service saves you money & storage space and helps to keep things in use. Search the inventory on-line (see Buxton Library of Things (myturn.com), register as a member, and once your registration has been confirmed (can be a few hours sometimes), reserve your items for collection from the Library on Saturday mornings 10-12 or Monday evenings 5-7pm.

Repair Cafe Impact

In 10 Repair Cafe sessions our wonderful volunteers fixed 200 items in 2023. According to the Repair Cafe Carbon Calculator that is a **saving of 6 tonnes of CO2**, which is the equivalent of 27,300 miles driven in a petrol car.

The next Repair Cafe session in the Methodist Church on the Market Place is on 24 August, 9:30am - 1pm, last item in 12:30. Then 28 Sept, 26 Oct, and 23 Nov before a break for Christmas.





Buxton Wild Weeks

All children in 5 Buxton Primary Schools have enjoyed this year's Buxton Wild Weeks (BWW) from 20th May to 25th June. Our fantastic volunteers have delivered a wide range of nature connection activities to children from Nursery up to Year 6. Our outdoor learning activities have included pond dipping, owl pellet analysis, studying invertebrates and learning about pollinators. Emma from Derbyshire Wildlife Trust (DWT) shared their Derby Cathedral Peregrine Project and children learnt about natural methods of flood management with DWT's George. Jackie from Peak District National Park, who initiated Buxton Wild Weeks back in 2021, focused on invertebrates at Grinlow and children also explored the flora and fauna of BCA's Sherbrook and Grinlow Woodlands with Frag. Lindsey and Frances want to thank all of our fantastic schools, organisations and inspiring Wild Weeks volunteers, Debbie, Frankie, Graham, Joan, Karen and Vicki. Thank you also to Sheila and Chris from Derbyshire Amphibian and Reptile Group as their winter work with Lindsey on school ponds made this year's pond dipping possible. Transition Buxton has been pleased to host the Buxton Wild Weeks project for the last 3 years, but it will now be moving to a new home with Derbyshire Wildlife Trust who are better placed to provide the infrastructure and support that the BWW team need.

Student Conference November 24

We are fortunate that many other local organisations share TB's commitment to protecting our environment and addressing climate change. The Rotary Club of Buxton and District Group are one of these organisations and so it is great news that they will be hosting a climate conference for schools this year. Their Climate Clever Schools project with Kids Against Plastic is the theme for their event which takes place on **21st November**. TB members, Carol, Jean, Maggie and Frances are working with Rotary members to help organise this and we hope to have Transition Buxton projects represented, so please let us know if you would like to be involved.

Please look out for last year's student conference in the Buxton Short Film Exhibition in July. We submitted our fantastic film, created by Jamie from The Agnew Film Company, and we hope that it reaches a wide audience during the Buxton Festival Fringe.
